# Celebration of World and African statistical Day in Burundi

Although there were financial problems, Burundi through the Institute of Statistics and Economic Studies of Burundi (ISTEEBU) fully and jointly commemorated two events: World Statistics Day and the Day of the African Statistical dated 18.11.2010 and 19.11.2010 in Bujumbura, Hotel Source du Nil. Theme: Celebrating the many advances of official statistics, the core values of service, integrity and professionalism.



The Minister of Planning and Municipal Development, Mr Peter Mupira, presented on Thursday, November 18, 2010 at the Hotel Source du Nil in Bujumbura at the opening session of the 18th World Day of the African statistician. The day was celebrated under the theme "Celebrating the many advances in official statistics, the core values of service, integrity and professionalism." His speech stressed the reason for the theme of this year, responding to the many successes achieved in the field of statistics. "The development of Burundi is impossible without statistical analysis that is the basic tool for the success of the Vision 2025 challenge," he said.

He reflected on the importance of statistics on in the vision 2025, the establishment of the institution statistics and surveys already conducted by the statistics department and the general census of population and housing. The general census of enterprises and

the national report on progress towards achieving the Millennium Development Goals in 2010.

The Director General of the Institute



of Statistics and Economic Studies of Burundi (ISTEEBU), Mr. Nicolas NDAYISHIMIYE, said that despite difficulties, he was able to paint a picture of significant progress in the assets of his department. He cited the establishment of legal and institutional arsenal since 2007, the development and adoption of the national development strategy by the Government of Burundi in 2009, developing the legal framework for growth and fight against poverty, the second generation PRSP, etc. The Director General of ISTEEBU recalled that the establishment of a good strategy to help decision makers make better choices in the country's reconstruction. Statistics is a strong element of good governance and provides a reliable base for developing, managing, monitoring and evaluating policy, such as reducing poverty, he concluded.



During the two days of work, participants analyzed the statistical laws and their implementing legislation, the national strategy for statistical development, the problem of statistical training in Burundi, and the role of statistics in the field of health. The use of statistics in Burundi began in 1948 but the Legislative Decree No. 1 / 17 of September 25, 2007 commonly called the 'law of statistics' recently enacted requires other mechanisms to be fully effective.



# World Statistics Day injutives worlwide

#### **Australia**

World Statistics Day was celebrated at Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) offices across the country with cake, presentations and seminars for staff and key statistics users. Other organisations also took the opportunity to celebrate and acknowledge the importance of statistics, including the Statistical Society of Australia (SSAI), the Office of Economic and Statistical Research, Queensland and the Australian Prudential Regulation Authority.

The Australian Statistician, Mr Brian Pink hosted a world Statistics Day seminar at the ABS Central Office in Canberra where Professor Glenn Withers from Universities Australia spoke about the importance of statistics in decision making.

Mr Pink also released three papers: the <u>Guide for Using Statistics for Evidence Based Policies</u> (cat. No. 1500.0); the Community Trust in ABS Statistics Survey results; and the NatStats 2010 Conference Recommendations.

The Guide for Using Statistics was produced by the Statistical Literacy Unit of the ABS to assist people to use quality data to inform their decisions, especially in the area of policy making. The Guide has been highly praised by peak bodies in Australia and overseas.

The Community Trust in ABS
Statistics Survey was conducted in
July 2010 by an organisation
independent of the ABS. The survey
found 92% of community
respondents 'tended to trust' or
'trusted' ABS statistics 'a great deal'
while the corresponding figure for
specialist users was 100%.

Among the NatStats 2010
Recommendations was a recognition that citizens must be able 'to critically evaluate and understand statistics' and that 'producers of statistics should both advocate and take practical measures to support enhanced statistical education that will lead to improved statistical literacy'.

The Education Services Unit of ABS promoted World Statistics Day to schools across Australia and suggested ways for teachers to promote statistics in their classrooms.

# World Statistics Day in Estonia

#### **WSD** Conference:

On 20 October World Statistics Day was celebrated for the first time, under the auspices of the United Nations. Statistics Estonia organised conference "Estonian Statistics in Focus" for this occasion. "Official statistics influence everyday life very much, they enable us to observe the trends of social life and the economy and serve as the basis for making

decisions by government, enterprises and the whole society," remarked Mr

Priit Potisepp, the Director General of Statistics Estonia. "The conference was to discuss the situation of official statistics on the threshold of the 90th birthday of Estonian statistics and the expectations and demands on statistics of the 21st century information society," Mr Potisepp explained.

Based on recent statistics, the conference provided an overview of the Estonian economy, social life and some price developments in Estonia and in the rest of the world. "Also the biggest event of the near future was discussed - the Population and Housing Census taking place in 2011," Mr. Potisepp added. Experts from various subject areas of statistics, the Macroeconomic Analyst of Swedbank, Ms Maris Lauri, and the Audit Manager of the National Audit Office, Mr Urmet Lee, made presentations. The Opening speech was delivered by Mr Jürgen Ligi, the Minister of Finance and 192 participants took

# WSD activities aim to bring statistical literacy to public attention in Finland

Educational institutions were the target for the first World Statistics Day in Finland. The goals were to highlight the significance of reliable information in everyday life and in decision making, to familiarize people with statistics and to promote the Official Statistics of Finland.

The producers of Official Statistics gave educational institutions an opportunity to invite a visiting ex-pert to give a lecture of any topic related to statistics and statistical literacy. Altogether 13 schools vary-ing from elementary school to upper secondary school and reaching from southern Finland to upper north were visited, some via video conference.

Professor Seppo Laaksonen, was one of the visiting experts. He visited an upper secondary school in Orimattila that was a successor of the school he used to go to years ago. "The feeling that I was left with was very powerful. I noticed that the school premises had gone through many changes but the fact that statistics were given as little attention as before was evident. Getting students excited of statistics was a challenge", Seppo said. He discussed the latest results of PISA (Programme for International Student Assessment) with students and highlighted that students' self-efficacy was an important factor in the learning process. "I think that it is vital to encourage students' self-efficacy in studying and in making the best of their own lives", Seppo said.

#### Learning materials to promote statistical literacy

A number of new learning materials were also produced and shared via Statistics Finland's website. The materials are free of charge and some are published in English as well as Finnish. The English ma-terials were developed in cooperation with the ISLP-network. Look at the materials at Statistics Finland's website or at ISLP-website.

To attract public attention Statistics Finland prepared a press release discussing the most typical characteristics of a Finnish female and male. The release was accompanied by a small exhibition of a typical Finnish at the Library of Statistics.

In summary, World Statistics Day was a vast amount of work but received a reasonable amount of media attention and positive feedback from educational institutions and from visiting lecturers. School visits especially can be viewed as groundbreaking work in promoting statistical literacy as a part of the work of every statistician.

The United Nations (UN) determined it was time that the world acknowledged the important role of official statistics in our societies and economies. Who at Statistics Canada wouldn't agree with that? The UN chose October 20, 2010 as the day, and Statistics Canada was among the hundreds of statistical organizations around the globe that marked this historic occasion. The Chief Statistician, Wayne Smith, felt this was a day to also acknowledge the valuable contributions of all statistical employees, since statistics are only as good as the people who make them possible: "On World Statistics Day, I wish to recognize the critical role you play in supporting official statistics in Canada and look forward to your continued collaboration." Work on the event began in March 2010, when our participation in the event was first announced and a WSD Committee was formed. The committee had countless decisions to make about who, what, where, how and when. But, finally, posters went up, a venue was decided on and invitations were sent out.

Directors from all Statistics
Canada's divisions were asked to
identify three or four of their
employees who wanted to attend. A
link to a live broadcast was created
and made accessible on the Internal
Communications Network for
employees who wished to watch
from their desktops. This meant
that everyone could participate.

#### On the day

To kick off the celebration, employees on their way in to work were greeted by senior managers, who wished them a happy World Statistics Day and offered them hot beverages. At 1:00 p.m. the celebration began. Invited guests and panel members were introduced to ""We are Statistics Canada" the first of two featured videos. It can be viewed on the UN's World Statistics Day Canada page, StatCan's external site and YouTube.

Next, the podium was turned over to Mr. Smith, who introduced our special WSD guests and and speakers, saying, "I want to thank each and every one of you for your important contributions to the Canadian statistical system...this occasion would not be complete without hearing from some of our stakeholders and data users." Up first were our invited guests from the National Bureau of Statistics of China, who spoke about their successful collaboration with Statistics Canada on the Statistical Management and Information Program—an important partnership that spans over 15 years. We were honoured to hear delegation members speak about the benefits of this truly international collaboration and pleased they joined us for the celebration. Next to speak was Peter Hall, Vicepresident and Chief Economist at Export and Development Canada, who shared his point of view on the importance of the work we do. He humorously likened the topic of statistics to "watching paint dry," but he went on to say that although the science of statistics may be regarded by many as "dreary," the data we produce is invaluable and plays a pivotal role in the guidance of what we plan, accomplish and appreciate in our society.

Mr. Smith next introduced Bruce Little, author, former Special Advisor to the Governor of the Bank of Canada, and former Economics Writer for The Globe and Mail. He stressed the necessity of quality statistics and strong data in order to understand "what makes our world tick." He went on to say that "we need your steady hand" in order to see things as they really are and make good decisions. Mr. Little closed with "we all have reason to think about how millions of Canadians believe that a sound statistical system is a vital part of how Canada works."

Mr. Hall and Mr. Little comprised our panel of experts, and indulged the audience with a lively question and answer period.

The afternoon concluded with the

unveiling of the video, "Statistics Canada: An Employee
Perspective". The video featured 11 employees from various divisions, all occupying unique positions at various levels of responsibility. Each shared their thoughts and feelings about the work they do, their values and their contributions to Canadian society.

# WORLD STATISTICS DAY WEEK ACTIVITIES: KINNAIRD COLLEGE FOR WOMEN, LAHORE, PAKISTAN

The Islamic Countries Society of Statistical Sciences organized World Statistics Day activities in the city of Lahore. Pakistan for the entire week from Monday, October 18 to Saturday, October 23, 2010. Feedback from participants indicated that they found the Academic Sessions informative and interesting, the atmosphere pleasant and inspiring, and the Prize Distribution Ceremony a befitting culmination to a highly successful day.

The faculty and students of the Kinnaird College Statistics Department are deservedly proud that Kinnaird College For Women in Lahore, Pakistan was the first educational institution in the world to celebrate World Statistics Day! The President of the International Statistical Institute (ISI), Professor Jozef Teugels, has invited national and regional societies of Statistics to celebrate World Statistics. In this regard, and following that call, a round table has been organized under the IX CLATSE where we discussed "Ethical Issues in Official Statistics" maintaining, of course, a strict academic and technical line. The panelists addressed the issue from different angles: the accuracy of the information of the statistical offices, the ethical issues of future professionals in statistics, the lack of a code of practice in the region,

The theme of the round table is very suggestive and important. Suggestive mainly by what has been expressed in 1985 by Professor Edmond Malinvaud, who said that: "The first service, and more often the most important for those working in official statistics, is to put the politicians, the leaders of the economy and the responsible for public opinion, confronted to reality. Human groups always tend to create their myths and arguments in order to preserve them. Those who work in statistics, bringing real situations, prevent these myths to separate men from reality and to neglect the underlying problems". The theme is therefore important for the manipulation of Official Statistics that we support in several countries such as Argentina."


#### **Portugal**

#### **EarlyStatistics Comenius Course**

The course "EarlyStatistics: In-Service Training in Statistics Education" will be offered three times during 2011. This course is the main outcome of the EU funded Socrates-Comenius project Enhancing the Teaching and Learning of Early Statistical Reasoning in European Schools (Ref. No: >226573-CP-1-2005-1-CY-COMENIUS-C21, 2005-2008). It is offered as a LLP Comenius inservice course targeting European elementary and secondary school mathematics teachers. The course aims at helping teachers improve their pedagogical and content knowledge of statistics through exposure to innovative educational tools and resources, and cross-cultural exchange of experiences and ideas.

The following three sessions of the course have been planned for 2011. Session 1: Nicosia, Cyprus; May 22-29, 2011 Session 2: Nicosia, Cyprus; July 17-24, 2011

Session 3: Nicosia, Cyprus;

Sept. 11-18, 2011

The above mentioned course editions are included in the LLP Comenius Training Database, therefore individuals interested in attending the course can apply for a Comenius (school education) mobility grant to cover both the course fees and accommodation and subsistence costs. In order to do so, they should contact the Lifelong Learning Programme National Agency in their country.

Please be aware that to apply for Sessions 1 and 2 of the course, the deadline to request a LLP grant from their National Agency is the 14th of January 2011. The deadline to apply for a LLP grant for Session 3 of the course is the 29th of April 2011. The registration process in Italy for the ongoing ISLP poster competition is now over. The Italian marketing campaign ended up with 30 teachers and 559 students registering for the competition.

Reaching such a high number of participants is thanks to a joint venture of the Italian Official Statisticians and of the Italian Academic Statisticians. Both the President of Istat – prof. Enrico Giovannini – and the President of the Italian Statistical Society (SIS) prof. Maurizio Vichi- accepted the proposal to support together the ISLP initiative.

A joint committee, who translated the competition materials from English into Italian at the same time keeping contact with the ISLP International Committee, was established. Italy also wants to inform that thanks to the donations of Istat and SIS the winners of the Italian competition will be awarded.
