Rules

Statistical Poster

The participants must create a statistical poster. They can choose the topic freely.

- The assignment must be based on using, analysing and interpreting statistics.
- The statistical poster must be created by the participants.
- It is not acceptable to use a poster that has already participated in earlier international competitions.
- The poster can be either in the participant's own language or English.
- The data can be either collected by the participants themselves or published by a reliable party. If the participants use data published by others, it is important to evaluate the reliability of the sources and to remember to include references.
- The poster should not have any personal information of the participants or the teaching institution. This information is written in a separate attachment in order to guarantee an equal judging process.
- The teaching institution delivers the entries to the country coordinator in the way agreed between them. The national jury will select the best competition entries of each country. The winning posters will be sent to the international competition.
- •The poster can be returned in paper form or as a PDF.
- The statistical poster must be two-dimensional (one page) and one-sided. The maximum size is A1 (841 mm x 594 mm). The maximum size for a poster returned as an attachment is 10 Mt. It is recommended to leave 3 cm margins on the sides of the poster, so that it can be framed if needed.
- Posters that arrived after the deadline will not be taken into account.

When planning the statistical poster, it is recommended that you check the poster evaluation criteria in the international competition website.

The statistical posters participating in the competition are the property of the ISLP project and the International Statistical Institute (ISI) and they will not be returned. By sending a statistical poster, the students consent to having the poster presented in different ISLP and ISI events, occasions, and the Internet.

Participation

You can participate in the competition in a team of 1-5 students. There is no participation fee in the competition.

The competition has three categories:

- 1. lower secondary schools
- 2. upper secondary schools
- 3. universities/universities of applied sciences, Bachelor level students

Lower secondary school and upper secondary school teams are registered by teachers or faculty staff, and the teacher also sends the posters to the country coordinator of their country.

The students from universities or universities of applied sciences will contact the country coordinator of each country to sign up, either by themselves or with their professor. The teacher/professor can supervise their work or, for example, use it as a part of a course.
